### **KEEPING YOU INFORMED** Newspaper Articles Show the Impacts of Service Dogs on People with **Epilepsy**

Two recent newspaper stories have profiled two people in BC with epilepsy who have

service dogs. These dogs were trained to activate an alert system and bark for help if a person has a seizure. #### **People with Multiple Sclerosis More Likely to Have Epilepsy**

A new study has shown that people with Multiple Sclerosis (MS) are more likely to have epilepsy. This data was based on the rate of hospital admissions in England. The researchers found that hospital admissions for epilepsy in people with MS were significantly higher than the general population. The researchers concluded that MS and epilepsy occur together more commonly than by chance. One possible reason for this is that a brain lesion caused by MS could cause epilepsy. <u>Click here</u> for a summary of this study.

#### New Program to Study Contraceptive/Birth Control Methods for Women with Epilepsy

Some seizure medications may interfere with some contraceptive/birth control methods and therefore make them ineffective or less effective. To address this researchers at the Harvard Medical School and Columbia University Medical School have launched a program called the <u>Epilepsy Birth Control Registry (EBCR)</u>. This is a research project and educational website. This project aims to understand the safety and effectiveness of various forms of birth control for women with epilepsy. ## **Employment Support Services for People with Disabilities**

#### WORKING TOGETHER: THE NEIL SQUIRE SOCIETY

The <u>Neil Squire Society</u> is a Canadian non-profit organization that helps people with disabilities train for and find jobs.

Their <u>Working Together program</u> is a new initiative that provides wage subsidies and workplace assistance.

This program will help find and connect you to employers and then provide financial assistance to help cover your salary.

This program is free and serves people with all types of disabilities, including epilepsy, learning difficulties, and mental illness.

You can enroll if you:

- Are unemployed or working under 20 hours per week
- Are legally entitled to work in Canada
- Are not currently receiving EI and have not collected EI within the last three years
- Are ready to find a job!

While working with you and the employers, the Neil Squire Society will:

- Subsidize wages for a minimum of six months
- Provide the necessary worksite accommodations
- Complete necessary paperwork
- Provide ongoing support for the duration of the contract
